Ames Free Library Under New Leadership

Madeline Miele Holt (right) has been named director of the Library, replacing Annalee Bundy who retired June 30th after 14 years of service. Ms. Miele Holt has been with the library since 1998. After working as a representative for library automation systems vendors and an editor at R.R. Bowker, Madeline turned to librarianship and earned her MLS from Simmons College in 2001.

Under her supervision many new collections and services have been added, ranging from DVDs, downloadable audiobooks, an expansion of public Internet computers and access to new databases. Programs for adults were greatly expanded, including the Book Lovers of Easton on Cable Access Channel 9, Book Clubs, and new activities such as the Foodie Club which will be meeting again in the Fall.

Uma Hiremath (left) is the new assistant director joining the Library, July 1, 2008. Hiremath has most recently been assistant director at the Thayer Public Library, Braintree, MA. She has also been in senior reference positions at the West Orange Public Library, NJ and the New York Public Library and is a co-author of Reference and Information Services in the 21st Century. The library is pleased to welcome her on board, and will benefit from her professional experiences.

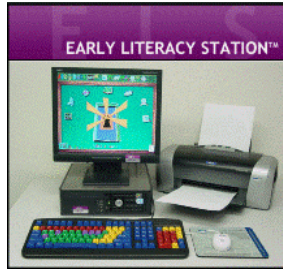

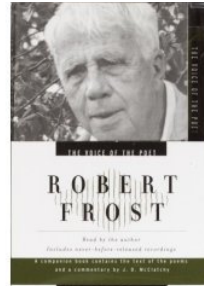
